I am the granddaughter of Bill and Mabel Stretch, and daughter of Heeney and Donna Stretch. I have five children, Hokowhitu (26), Raureka (25), Whitiora (20), Raiha (16) and Aniwaniwa (12). I have three mokopuna also who are the beat to my heart. I was raised in Palmerston North, but moved to Otaki to raise my tamaariki in the home lands of their father, and within the Kōhanga Reo and Kura Kaupapa Māori our extended whānau established in the late 1980's early 1990's.

I have spent most of my adult life working within either Māori medium or Māori education fields. These include Kōhanga Reo, Kura Kaupapa Māori, Te Wānanga o Raukawa, Massey University, Iwi Radio, and both traditional and contemporary Māori music scenes.

I describe myself as a child of the tribal experience established by our elders and the people of Ngāti Raukawa, Ngāti Toarangatira and Te Atiawa in 1975 called Whakatupuranga Rua Mano, or Generation 2000. It was during this 25 year programme that I discovered who I am, through whakapapa, and the many relationships within and between the many marae of our rohe where we were schooled every school holidays of my youth. It is here that my whānau, and many others within the programme reconnected with our reo me ōna tikanga, having not had any of those attributes in childhood. My children and now mokopuna, consequently, have been fortunate to have te reo as their mother tongue and are competent in both tikanga Māori and te ao whānui being bi-lingual. I consider them and their upbringing one of my biggest accomplishments.

I have been involved in, taught and developed many language initiatives, being a student, a teacher and teacher of teachers over the years following the completion of Whakatupuranga Rua Mano.

It is with this real life experience that I enter this most exciting project, the development of a reo me ona tikanga strategy for my people of Ngāti Kuia, te Pouwhakarewarewa i te kete korero a Kuia! I am excited to be given this opportunity to reconnect with the mother land, te whenua o Kuia.

Kaumātua were delighted to receive a Koha from Ngāti Koata at the Dinner. The Kohatu Pounamu, pictured, acknowledges the close relationship between our two iwi, and our many whakapapa connections.

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This edition includes an introduction to our manager for our Te Reo Strategy development project; Angie Stretch. This project is one of many of the exciting things happening next year. We have sent out surveys to the 17 whānau groups currently enrolled in the Whānau Whenua Initiative. We are half way through this initiative and our navigators would welcome more enquiries.

So much has happened this year since we reopened Te Hora Marae on the early hours of 19 March 2016. The Marae, as of last week, was used by Civil Defence for the Havelock flooding. We are getting used to the new facilities and it is good to see that Marae bookings are on the increase.

REBECCA MASON NGĀTI KUIA TE TAUIHU IWI HEALTH BOARD REPRESENTATIVE

Hauora Project – As I mentioned at our hui after the Annual General Meeting I am currently working on a proposal to better understand what the health needs are for Ngāti Kuia. We are hoping to undertake this mahi in partnership with some other external organisations and will also be forming a health advisory group from within Ngāti Kuia.

Iwi Health Board (IHB) – As Ngāti Kuia's representative on the IHB I have continued to attend monthly meetings. It has been agreed that the top priorities for the Board during 2016/17 are:

- A need for the DHB to lift performance against Māori Health priority indicators. Currently the DHB is only meeting one of the 13 indicators for Māori
- A need for the DHB to move resources/funding to where the greatest population's health need is within our district, which is Māori, Pacific and lower-socioeconomic

- 3. A need for the DHB to work intersectorially with other sectors to address issues that are the wider determinants (housing, employment, welfare, education, justice). Inequitable access to the wider determinants of health creates health inequities for Māori relative to the rest of the population
- 4. Māori Health workforce capacity development NMDHB's Māori workforce is only at 3%
- 5. Māori provider development
- A need to focus on our young Māori population (pēpi, tamariki, rangatahi) within the context of their whānau (inclusive of health literacy and a focus on prevention, early intervention and staying well)

New General Manager Māori Health and Vulnerable Populations - Ditre Tamatea. The IHB welcomed Ditre to his new role where he will be working with the IHB to improve Māori health.

Their works showed off our culture and represented Ngāti Kuia extremely well. Some pieces were more traditional weaving and stone carving, while others were contemporary. All of them were held to a high standard.

Overall the exhibition was a great success for both the artists and the organisers. Many artworks were sold and it has established a great platform for Ngāti Kuia artists in the future.
