Huataki Whareaitu – Vice Chairperson

He uri whakaheke ahau nō Tūtepourangi rāua ko Hinearorangi.

Nā rāua ko Hinekawa ka noho ia i a Te Kotimana a Jock McGregor ka hikaia atu ko Teone Makerika, ka noho a Teone i a Pirihira Poutu nō Ngāti Raukawa hei wahine tuatahi māna, ka hikaia atu ko Hokowhitu Makerika ka noho i a Titihuia Ngāpu ka hikaia atu ko Rangitaiki Makerika ka noho i a William Stretch ka hikaia atu ko taku māmā a Te Hanatia kātahi ko au ko Huataki.

I am a kaitiaki of the Ngāti Kuiatanga Pou this role has responsibility to ensure our tikanga is present and observed at all levels of our operation Mai i te Kāhui maunga ki Tangaroa. Another role is to assist as kaitiaki for the Tangata Pou our responsibility is for you Te Iwi. I'm fortunate to be part of the "He Maunga Pakohe Rautaki Hauora" Health initiative.

Currently I am employed as Cultural Competency and Tikanga Facilitator by 'Te Pae Hauora o Ruahine o Tararua' 'MidCentral DHB' in the Manawatū. I am part of Te Rōpū Pae Ora Māori Health Directorate we work out of Te Whare Rapuora based at the Palmerston North Hospital Campus. She is a Trustee responsible for our Finance and Audit Pou along with Wayne Hemi, and is a member of our Grants Komiti. She is passionate about improving whānau outcomes and leadership development.

Emma has held people leadership positions in large NZ corporations and is currently employed by Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu as Business Support Manager. She has been responsible for complex transformational projects designed to improve agility and kaimahi engagement.

Emma currently lives in Christchurch with her partner and children. She is currently studying towards a Bachelor of Applied Management majoring in Strategic Management and is learning to korero te reo Māori via online classes with Te Wānanga o Raukawa.

WAKA WĀNANGA

The Ngāti Kuia waka project has completed three wānanga and have developed a working group and work plan.

We have secured funding and resources and developed a skilled working group.

The working group have completed draft design for the Ngāti Kuia waka tangata (12m) and the taurapa, tauihu, hoe and some tools are taking shape with the guidance of Midi Tareha, Tamahae Elkington, Ngaraiti Smith and Huataki Whareaitu.

The composite hull construction will be undertaken in Christchurh and we will continue to wānanga to increase our knowledge around other workstream ie kaihautū/kaihoe, kaimahi, waiata/haka, te reo me ona tikanga and look forward to the naming wānanga to complete the project.

We hope to have the 13m container (koha from Port Nelson) on site in the next few weeks. The next wānanga is on Saturday 09 December at Titiraukawa.

We plan to have this waka completed early 2018.

TAIAO

The Taiao Environmental team has been working on a number of projects including the building of a waka, the building of iwi monitor capacity, key ongoing policy work with all three Council's in developing Environmental Management Plans to the best effect to Ngāti Kuia and our environment. Other cultural and environmental consultation works with other organisations and projects continue to be part of our day to day activities.

Since the last pānui in June of this year, we have been successful in stopping a floodway mining application on the Whakamarino River at Canvastown. The applicant chose not to appeal the Councils decision so this was worthwhile and successful mahi which was a good team effort.

Back in May we presented our case against salmon farms being relocated in to Te Hoiere (Pelorus Sound) for environmental and cultural reasons. We have requested a copy of the report that was presented to the Minister of Primary industries prior to the election under the Official Information Act. We expect a response to that request on 23 November.

We now have resources (Environmental) management plan work going on with all three Councils which are all at different stages of development. The Marlborough Hearings are starting this week with iwi first to present on matters of concern to our iwi. This will be ongoing for many more months to come.

HE MAUNGA PAKOHE RAUTAKI HAUORA

This Ngāti Kuia driven whānau ora initiative aims to help our whānau both now and for generations to come.

Supported by Te Pūtahitanga Whānau Ora Collective, we know that we can make a real difference for our whānau by influencing the providers of our health and social services and together focusing on what we know will make a difference.

We want our whānau voice to be heard in the corridors of government and we are determined to advocate for more change that will benefit whānau at the flax roots where it really matters.

Guided by our 20 year Strategic Plan, we have been working on building our Hauora Strategy. It consists of a few key strands, that when woven together, will make sure that we are on the right path.

Over the last six months, we have established a Ngāti Kuia Hauora Advisory Rōpū who will make sure that our whānau drive the decisions that are being made, as well as providing guidance and advice. Current members are John Hart, Christine Hemi, Carol Hippolite, Rebecca Mason, Raiha Stretch, Victoria Thorn, Carolynn Tipene, Ethan Wells and Huataki Whareaitu.

Our first strand is about setting the foundation and overall approach for our hauora conversations and research with whānau. We need to decide whether we should focus in on just a few things (e.g. rangatahi and/or kaumātua hauora) or are we better to have a broad ranging conversation that allows whānau to provide the direction. We also need to decide how these conversations will take place e.g. hui, focus groups, on-line or a mix of all three.

The second strand of our Hauora Strategy is all about Ngāti Kuia whānau and better understanding what it is that we all face every day - what are the real health and social challenges that need to be dealt with? We also hope to record some of these stories (the good and the not so good!) because this will not only give us another view of our Ngāti Kuia history, it will also help us to influence the hauora agencies and providers and to work with them to do things differently.

Lastly, we will review and analyse what whānau have said and see whether there are any common needs and challenges across Ngāti Kuia (along with any significant individual whānau challenges that might also need Ngāti Kuia support). This will guide us in developing targeted hauora initiatives or projects that will give us the greatest impact and enable us all to realise our dreams and aspirations as quickly as possible.

BFF HUSBANDRY COURSE
