REALISING MY DREAM AS A PAEDIATRIC NURSE

I would like to extend a large thank you to Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Kuia Trust for your support towards my studies over the past six years. I have just completed my studies in a Conjoint Bachelor of Health Sciences and Bachelor of Nursing, which means I have completed two degrees. This means I am eligible to graduate on 15 December 2020 at the University of Auckland graduation ceremony.

On Monday 21 September 2020, I began working in my dream job as a Registered Nurse in the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) at Starship hospital. This unit is located in the national Children's Hospital in New Zealand. Children in this unit are typically on life support or requiring intensive medical care. PICU is the only dedicated children's intensive care facility in the country and is also where children who are transported via the national children air ambulance are treated.

This is part of the reason why I consider myself to be very fortunate to have the opportunity to work within such a specialised unit and alongside some of New Zealand's best health professionals. I am extremely excited to start caring for and supporting the children and their families in this unit.

Your support towards my studies has reduced the cost of my University fees for my studies and subsequently decreased my student loan. It has also enabled me to focus on my studies by reducing my living costs and the stress of completing significant hours of part-time work, as I am living in Auckland away from my whānau who reside in Palmerston North.

My whānau and I would like to pass on our thanks to you, your contribution and support have enabled me to complete my studies to a high degree. With your support I am now able to work in an area of health where Māori are significantly and inequitably overrepresented, allowing me to care for their children alongside their whānau.

We stand here strong and proud as the uri of Ngāti Kuia. Our history of inter iwi warfare, colonisation, cultural deprivation and systematic discrimination could well have disconnected us from the wellbeing of our iwi as an entity and the iwi as us, the people. It is through our strength that bridges us to repair the intergenerational destitution experienced by our tūpuna that will continue to result in the reparation attained from Te Tiriti o Waitangi settlements.

My aspirations as a Trustee is to awhi our people to implement succession planning. This recognisable pathway for whānau to engage in their success will be apparent and abundant.

My aspirations are to continue to support the awesome mahi that is already underway in developing a strong and thriving iwi economy. Many of our whānau were displaced from their whenua, where once they moved freely, and cared for their whānau, harvested kai, and gathered rongoa.

We have the opportunity to tautoko whānau while in our recent history our tūpuna were made destitute and marginalised to realise the potential of their whenua. Only collectively as a whānau can we move forward and right these injustices. We are kaitiaki and hold the responsibility to ensure the care of our whenua for future generations.

I will stand up for our people. I will champion our values, and history. We are in a position to challenge the status quo and to elevate and invest in our people.

The mahi at hand is not easy and will take generations to rectify but we are a resourceful, innovative and a prevailing people, we are entrepreneurs, innovators, and navigators. The tamariki of Māui. We are so much more than the sum of our parts.

It has taken a while for me to realise our true potential. We need to, 'ask not what our iwi can do for us but what we can do for our iwi'. Ko au te awa, ko te awa ko au.

The Ngāti Kuia Bee Course started up again in August 2020. We filled a full cohort in the popular Level 3 Certificate in Apiculture, which is delivered by Otago Polytechnic. Classes run approximately every second Friday from August 2020 to April 2021 at Titiraukawa.

We sat down with whanaunga, Carol Tipene, to learn about her experience in the Level 3 course.

"The first thing I want to say is I absolutely loved it. Best part is I needed a retirement

plan and I just think this is a great way to do it. Who knew bees would be such a great industry to get into? Suddenly I'm looking in my garden and I can recognise what plants are better for the bees.

Regarding the learning, the roopu I'm with on the course are just so helpful. I'm so grateful to learn with my whanaunga, especially as I've not enjoyed the computer part, so got lots of good help.

One of the least favourite bits was the bees. I was afraid of the bugs. But I learnt they didn't give two hoots about me.
When I first realised, I had to touch them I wasn't keen, but then I got over my fear.

I find myself saying to people when I'm going off to Titiraukawa to do the course, especially when friends and family look at me and wonder what I'm doing, is that I believe it's never too late to learn something new. It's the best thing that has happened to me, is the bees, the honey, and the knowledge that nothing

has changed for the bees in thousands of years. In this Covid-19 time to find something new to learn in such a crappy year has been amazing."




THE POWER IN WORKING TOGETHER

It has been a year since the Te Hoiere River Catchment Project was launched. In December 2019, the Minister of Conservation, at the time, Eugenie Sage, along with delegates from Councils and central government, visited Te Hora Marae during our yearly Kaumātua Christmas celebration to launch this project with Ngāti Kuia.

In July everything was in place to begin the work on Te Hoiere to restore the water quality. Local reporter, Chloe Ranford shared

this magnificent news of these developments, in her Stuff.co.nz news article, 'Work begins on multimillion-dollar project to restore water quality in Marlborough Sounds catchment'.

Sophie was able to share that, 'the project was able to deal with detrimental environmental issues, and the first phase focuses on Havelock Estuary to Cullen Creek. Subsidiary to the work on the awa, aspirations of setting up a native plant nursery and extending the long-tailed bat programme are on the horizon.'

Our chairperson, Waihaere Mason is delighted by the project, saying "You're attending to Papatūānuku, Mother Earth, and we will do everything in our power to support the project...We must work as one if the outcome is to earn the title 'exemplar'."

The project involves the collaboration of great scale and is one of the first to be delivered under the Kotahitanga mō te Taiao Alliance, made up of most iwi from Te Tauihu, and local and central government representatives.

We would like to introduce you to Te Kāhui Mātauranga o te Tau Ihu | Te Tauihu. The Kāhui is made up of the eight iwi across Te Tau Ihu | Te Tauihu; namely Ngāti Apa ki Te Rā Tō, Ngāti Kuia, Rangitāne o Wairau, Ngāti Koata, Ngāti Rārua, Toa Rangatira, Ngāti Tama ki Te Tauihu and Te Ātiawa o Te Waka a Māui. We gathered together for the first of many wānanga and kōrero at Whakatū marae on Monday 9 November 2020. The Kāhui is mandated by our local Iwi Chairs Forum for the purposes of Māori engagement in education and the provision of mātauranga Māori in education settings. Our kāhui is made up of representatives appointed by each of the iwi, with a range of experience from across the education sector.

Our wānanga was an opportunity for the committee to be officially 'stood up' and begin on our journey to guide and influence the Ministry of Education and the responsibilities as a Tiriti o Waitangi partner. Our priorities over the coming months are to begin the collation of resources to enable the sharing of our pūrākau from all of our Te Tau Ihu | Te Tauihu iwi. Also, understand how we might be able to strengthen whānau participation in governance and leadership on school boards.

There is quite a bit of work to get the ball rolling in this space, to activate these pieces of work we have received funding from the Ministry of Education to support resource by way of a Project Lead. Joining us on this journey is a descendant of all of our eight iwi, Mona-Pauline (MP) Mangakāhia (bright pink koti). MP brings her extensive project management skills and is excited by the prospect of us all working together on this kaupapa.

We look forward to sharing our journey and progress along the way. Watch this space for our upcoming survey!

TE WAO O TITIRAUKAWA

This year, we were proud to announce that Ngāti Kuia had been successful in receiving a PGF Whenua Māori grant. This grant will be used to create the first Te Tauihu iwi led kānuka processing facility at Titiraukawa. Under-secretary for Regional Economic Development, Fletcher Tabuteau announced all the successful applicants and projects as part of the Provincial Growth Fund. We were the only iwi to receive funding in this specific announcement. Our dream of building a Kānuka Processing Plant *is now coming to fruition.*

It was great to sit down with one of our Commercial Advisors, Ra Winiata to discuss Te Wao o Titiraukawa. Ra shared further developments and great opportunities for our whānau to get involved.

Very soon we will have confirmation and details for an inaugural Ngāti Kuia iwi-focused level 2 and level 3 horticulture training programme. It is envisaged that this training will be delivered at Titiraukawa. This is a partnership between Ngāti Kuia and NMIT and is a course that will take 12 months to complete.

Places will be open to 12-14 trainees of Ngāti Kuia whakapapa. This inaugural programme would ideally suit whānau based in Te Tauihu as it is very hands on requiring a commitment of 2-3 days a week. The course will be tailored to Ngāti Kuia whānau using karakia, maramataka and te taha Māori of horticulture, bringing in our own flavour and expertise handed down by our tūpuna.

One of the aims for those who have completed level 2 is to provide part-time employment to work in and develop Te Wao o Titiraukawa, The Rongoa Forest of Titiraukawa. This work will involve creating a plan and planting the rongoa forest. The vision is to plant 45,000 kānuka, 5,000 mānuka, and 5,000 mixed natives. Whānau will also be involved in a small wetland restoration project on the whenua.

We encourage whānau to get involved, be inspired, and share this opportunity with other whānau who would benefit from being part of this vision. We will open expression of interests soon with a course start date in February 2021. So, watch this space e te whānau.


It has been an auspicious year for whanaunga, Madi Williams, with much to celebrate.













